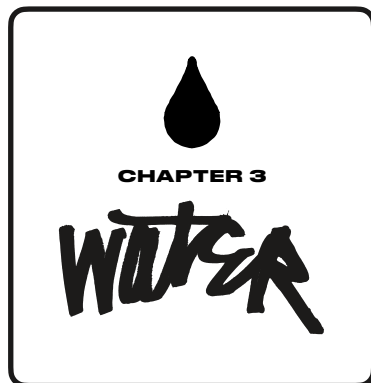

EARTH

RUNTIME—65 mins

Before 2020, mutual aid lived in the margins of organizing spaces, rooted in radical traditions of community autonomy and antifascism. When the pandemic hit, the term exploded. But with that popularity, its political edge was blunted by a misconception that mutual aid boils down to just distributing goods.

That misunderstanding has led to burnout and apathy. But liberatory mutual aid transforms our relationships, sustains us as we fight the State, and prepares communities to defend their autonomy. It's time to resharpen mutual aid's edge together.

How do we move out of reacting to crisis and into responding with strategy and vision? How do we prepare ourselves and our communities to live freely beyond the State?

This series is a tool to help communities reflect on their efforts, build strategy together, and sow real relationships and infrastructure that will sustain us as the systems around us crumble.

STEP 1 HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE



FACILITATION TIP: *Feel free to read the sections of this guide aloud together as a group!*

The Elements of Mutual Aid is a four-part series made to spark conversations. Today's episode is *Chapter 2, Earth* and this discussion guide offers a few **QUESTIONS & ACTIVITIES** to help dig into some deep conversation afterward.

Ideally everyone has a copy of this guide so everybody can help move the conversation along together.

Use the **NOTES** section at the end to jot down thoughts, the **GLOSSARY** section for helpful terms, and the **RESOURCES** section to find other powerful media.

- **The War on Drugs:** A global campaign led by the US since the 1970s supposedly to reduce the production and distribution of drugs. In reality, the US just became the world's biggest kingpin. The War on Drugs has been used as a excuse to manage global drug markets, manipulate foreign affairs, conduct genocide, and spread mass incarceration.
- **Zapatistas:** A Maya indigenous rebel movement in Southeast Mexico that started building autonomous zones in 1994 with their own schools, hospitals, collective agriculture, and culture. The Zapatistas are still resisting colonialism and capitalism to this day.



NOTES



- **Dual Power:** The concept of creating alternative infrastructure that can one day replace our reliance on the dominant power's institutions.
- **Harm Reduction:** The practice of providing support and supplies to people who use drugs to minimize risks.
- **Hierarchical:** A structure where a limited number of people have power over those beneath them.
- **Rojava:** A region of Northern Syria (or Western Kurdistan) made up of about 2 million people that has built a participatory system of direct democracy focused on women's rights and ecology. Also known as the Democratic Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria.
- **Safe-Injection:** Having the supplies, knowledge, and peer-to-peer support to use needles safely and reduce the risk of infections, injury, overdose, or death.
- **Solidarity Economy:** Practices for meeting our needs without private property and that aren't driven by profit. Solidarity economies require us to have relationships with each other and include our communities in decision-making.
- **Sovereignty:** Having control over territory and often includes being recognized by other national powers.
- **Top-Down Institution:** Formal organizations that have a command and control style of organizing and limit people's ability to make decisions for themselves.

STEP 2 ABOUT THIS CHAPTER

Before pressing play, let's check out a few of the main ideas in this chapter. *Earth* focuses on what we can build with mutual aid and how smaller, local efforts informed by their communities' needs and capacities can network and build longer-term infrastructure.

LEARNING GOALS

- *Level up from just reacting to crises to having a vision of what we're building toward*
- *Develop an understanding of why we have to be ready to defend any autonomy we build*
- *Think strategically about how to prepare our communities for tomorrow's disasters*

STEP 3 AFTER WATCHING



3.1 THOUGHTS OR QUESTIONS?

3.2 SET AGREEMENTS

Before getting into discussion, it can be helpful to set a couple agreements to call back on. Here are some basics:

- *make space for quieter voices*
- *help keep the conversation focused*
- *be mindful of time*

Does anybody have others they want to add?

FACILITATION TIP: *If the conversation meanders, you can say something like: "That's a really great point but could we refocus on the question?" If a few people are talking a lot while others are quiet you can say: "Can we make some space to hear from voices we haven't heard from yet?"*

GLOSSARY



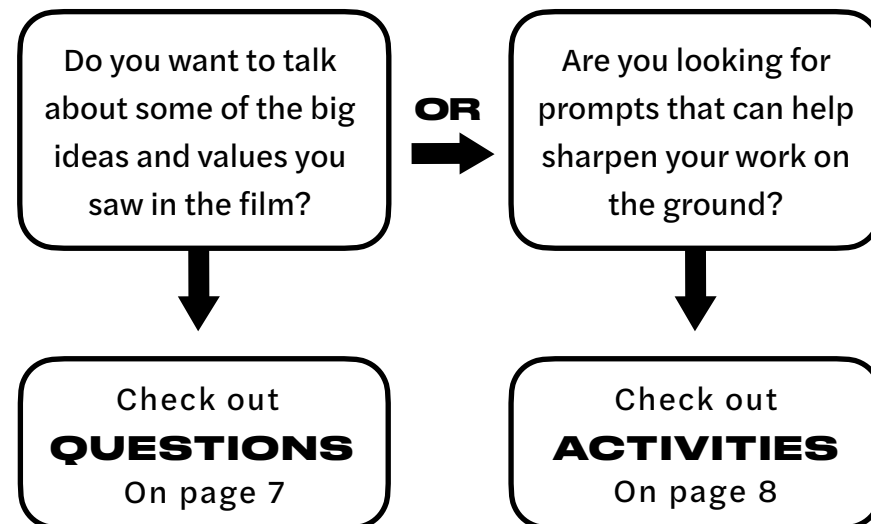
- **Austerity:** The gutting of social services, closure of public infrastructure, and selling off of public utilities to private companies.
- **Autonomy:** A community's ability to self-govern and meet their own needs without being dependent on the dominant system.
- **Borikén:** The indigenous, precolonial Taíno name for Puerto Rico.
- **CAMs (Centro De Apoyo Mutuos / Mutual Aid Centers):** Physical mutual aid spaces set up after Hurricane María across Borikén (Puerto Rico).
- **Cooperative Economics:** When we share the money, resources, infrastructure, and decision-making power needed to sustain our lives. Instead of having a single boss, we spread out the power and risk involved in managing our work.
- **Decentralized Network:** A system where multiple independent communities communicate and share resources without depending on a central authority.
- **Direct Democracy:** A practice of self-governance where the people themselves contribute directly to decisions affecting them. Direct democracy relies on delegates, who are responsible for sharing the people's input, instead of representatives, who make decisions for people.

STEP 5 NEXT STEPS

It's hard to take time away from the work of caring for our communities to have these conversations. But they're so important to our ability to doing this work well and to moving intentionally toward liberation instead of just reacting to crises. We encourage communities to continue prioritizing conversations like this. Here's a couple ways to keep using this series as a tool in your community:

- *Apply key takeaways from this discussion into your organizing.*
- *Plan a screening of another chapter with this group.*
- *Plan a screening with the wider community and offer the lessons you learned here.*
- *Dive into some of the resources and form study groups to digest them.*

STEP 4 PICK A TOPIC & DISCUSS



Take a few minutes to look over the QUESTIONS or ACTIVITIES as a group and pick one to focus on. Throughout the discussion, refer back to this list if you need more inspiration.

FACILITATION TIP: *Do you have a larger crowd? Divide up into smaller breakout groups and set an amount of time for discussion. At the end of the time, have all the groups come back together and share their main takeaways.*

QUESTIONS



1. How can we mature our work beyond just giving stuff away and reacting to crisis? What does it look like for mutual aid to be the foundation of community systems that sustain our everyday lives?
2. What are some ways to defend our efforts when the state is threatened by our autonomy?
3. In what ways do the relationships and skills that we're building today define how we're able to respond to tomorrow's crises?
4. What social infrastructure would a mutual aid-based society need to make the nation-state obsolete?

ACTIVITIES



1. Map out the different mutual aid projects in your community. Then talk about how these projects support each other. Are there ways they could be supporting each other more? Are there resources, skills, or relationships that you need?
2. List some local economic, political, and cultural challenges that stop your community from building projects or infrastructure. Then come up with a few specific steps you could take today to address each of them.
3. Talk about how well your neighborhoods could respond to an emergency today. Then brainstorm some ways to build more preparation and relationships before the next crisis.
